YOUR LIFE AS A SCOUT

Today you are a boy. Before long you will be a man. It is important to yourself that you become a citizen of fine character, physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight. Boy Scouting will help you become that kind of citizen. But also, Scouting will give you fellowship and fun.

Yes, it's fun to be a Boy Scout! It's fun to go hiking and camping with your friends... to swim... to dive... to paddle a canoe... to wield an ax... to follow the footsteps of the pioneers who led the way through the wilderness... to stare into the glowing embers of a campfire and dream of the wonders of the life that is in store for you.

It is also fun to learn to walk noiselessly through the woods... to stand close to a grazing deer without being noticed... to bring a bird close to you by imitating it's call. It is fun to find your way cross-country by map and compass...to make a meal when you are hungry...to take a safe swim when you are hot...to make yourself comfortable for the night in a tent or under the stars. In Scouting you become an outdoorsman.

But Scouting is far more than fun in the outdoors, hiking, and camping. Scouting is a way of life. Scouting is growing into responsible manhood, learning to be of service to others.

The Scout Oath and Scout Law are your guides to citizenship. They tell you what is expected of a Scout. They point out your duties. The Scout Motto is "Be Prepared"- prepared to take care of yourself and to help people in need. The Scout slogan is "Do a Good Turn Daily." Together, the motto and slogan spell out your ability and your willingness to serve.

Your life as a Scout will make you strong and self-reliant. You will learn Scout craft skills that will benefit you as you grow. In time, you will develop skills of leadership as well.

So pitch in! Swing into action! In your patrol and your troop you will have some of the best times of your life.



Troop Meetings and Functions:

Regular Troop Meetings

Troop 90 generally meets every Monday evening (except holidays) of every month from 7:00PM to 8:30PM at East Hills Community Church, 20660 Orange Terrace Parkway in Riverside. (Eating or drinking at or during Troop meetings is prohibited.) **Full uniform is required at each scout function.**

A lot of information is given out at the Troop meetings, so it is important that the Scouts bring a notebook with paper and a pencil to take notes. At times fliers will be handed out with information for the Scouts. To make sure this information is passed on to the parents of the Scouts, it would be a good idea to ask them if they received any fliers or were given any information as soon as they get home. Many times this information is washed in the uniform or left in the notebook and forgotten until it is too late. We would hate to have a Scout miss an outing because he forgot to give the information to his parents.

The Scout should also bring his Scout handbook with him as he will need it during the meetings and outings.

Hikes and Other Outdoors Activities

Troop 90 schedules at least one camp-out or other outdoor activity each month (see Troop 90 Calendar). We also schedule one week at a B.S.A. summer camp. The cost of each outdoor program is announced prior to the event, and is flexible to cover the cost of food, campsites, etc. The cost of food will depend on the menu the Scouts plan within their patrol.

Attendance at outdoor activities is not mandatory but strongly encouraged due to the fact that some skills and Merit Badges require participation in those types of events. Scouts who do participate are also eligible to receive many High Adventure awards made available through the various Boy Scout Councils. *Please note that radios, MP3 players, electronic games or wrist watches with electronic games are strictly prohibited at <u>ALL Troop activities</u>.*

TROOP 90 ORGANIZATION

Troop 90 is organized into Patrols of eight boys or less. The Scoutmaster, based on information, which each parent supplies, will place you in a Patrol. The Scoutmaster has the option to make changes with Patrols, as he/she deems necessary.



CODE OF CONDUCT

Our code of conduct helps provide a good scouting environment for the benefit of all. Each Scout BOY OR ADULT is expected to abide by the laws and rules of Troop 90.

UNIFORMS:

- Any Scout not wearing a uniform during a Troop Meeting will not be allowed in closing circle, unless excused by the Scoutmaster.
- A uniform shall consist of the official short sleeved Scout shirt with the proper insignia and patches (see page 11), official Scout pants, a Scout belt, official Scout baseball style cap or official Troop 90 baseball style cap, a proper neckerchief and slide. The Troop will provide a neckerchief upon joining the Troop, and another upon obtaining the rank of First Class.

TROOP and PATROL ELECTIONS:

- Troop elections shall take place every six (6) months during the months of February and August.
- The Senior Patrol Leader must ask Scoutmaster for permission to run and shall be elected by the
 entire Troop. He must attend at least 90% of all Troop and Patrol functions. Once elected to the
 position, the Senior Patrol Leader may not hold the office of Senior Patrol Leader or Assistant
 Senior Patrol Leader for a period of six months after completion of his term in office.
- The Assistant Senior Patrol Leader shall be appointed by the Senior Patrol Leader.
- All Patrol Leaders shall be elected by the Patrol, with the elected Patrol Leader appointing the
 Assistant Patrol Leader. Once elected to the position, the Patrol Leader may not hold the office
 of Patrol Leader or Assistant Patrol Leader for a period of months (six months for First Class
 patrols) after completion of his term of office.
- Scribe, Librarian, Chaplains Aide, etc. shall be appointed by the Senior Patrol Leader.
- <u>ALL</u> Troop Officers are subject to approval by the Scoutmaster. Any troop officer that does
 not meet the duties of the elected position may be removed from office at the discretion of the
 Scoutmaster
- Troop officers shall assume new positions at the first scheduled Troop Meeting of March or September.

PATROL LEADER COUNCIL:

- Patrol Leader Council will meet on the day scheduled by the Senior Patrol Leader and Scoutmaster.
- All Patrol Leaders, Senior Patrol Leader, Assistant Senior Patrol Leader and Scribe (or representatives of these persons) shall attend all meetings of the Patrol Leaders Council. Other Troop officers appointed by the Senior Patrol Leader may attend.
- The Troop Scribe shall present the minutes of the previous Patrol Leaders Council at the beginning of each meeting.

CAMP-OUTS:

- Scout uniform will be worn on all camp-outs and/or hikes unless otherwise directed by the adult leader in charge.
- The sign-up list for all camp-outs, unless otherwise announced will follow the following guidelines:
 - a. On the Troop Meeting one (1) week prior to the event, the sign-up list will be closed for additional names.
 - b. All money for the event must be paid to the proper persons by the end of the Troop Meeting immediately prior to the said event, or he will be unable to attend the said event.
 - c. Any Scout may be asked not to attend a specified event if it is considered by the adult members that it would be in the best interest of said Scout that he not attend a particular activity.

PATROL MEETINGS:

• Patrol Meetings, separate from the weekly Troop meeting, will be held at a minimum of once a month at a place and time chosen by the Patrol Leader or Assistant Patrol Leader.



ADVANCEMENT:

• Each Scout is expected to demonstrate progress through rank advancement and/or personal growth and achievement. When a boy is ready for a rank advancement, the Scoutmaster shall be contacted for a Personal Growth Conference. When this is completed, the Scoutmaster will notify the proper persons to set up a Board of Review. Full Scout uniform is required for both the Conference and Board of Review.

REVISIONS TO THE TROOP RULES:

- Troop rules can be revised as required by the Patrol Leaders Council not more than once in a three (3) month period. Subject to approval by the Troop Committee. (adults)
- Troop rules will be reviewed annually at the August TLC planning meeting, and shall be distributed to all Troop members as soon as possible.

IN GENERAL:

- Each Scout is expected to know and abide by the Scout Oath and Scout Law at all times, thereby demonstrating Scout Spirit.
- If, in the opinion of the Scoutmaster, any member of this Troop fails to adhere to the current list of Troop rules, and/or fails to live up to either the Scout Oath or the Scout Law, that Scout may be dropped from the active list of Troop members.
- Preserve and maintain all Troop equipment and respect the rights and belongings of others.
- Conduct yourself well at all times. Disruptive behavior, abusive language, swearing, and fighting are not a part of Scouting and <u>WILL NOT BE TOLERATED</u>. A Scout may receive a disciplinary notice for poor behavior. The Scoutmaster may also send him home and be restricted from the next Troop meeting. If the behavior problems continue it will result in SUSPENSION from all Troop activities for a period of one (1) month. If the problem still continues, the Scoutmaster with approval of the Troop Committee will EXPEL the Scout from the Troop.

The scout uniform is an important part of your Scouting life. WEAR IT PROUDLY! The uniform items you will need to purchase are:


In recognition of the 2010 Scouting Centennial, the uniform is be redesigned. Either uniform (old style or new style) is acceptable.

BOY SCOUT/VARSITY SCOUT UNIFORM INSPECTION SHEET


OFFICIAL PLACEMENT OF INSIGNIA

Conduct uniform inspection with common sense; the basic rule is neatness

Merit Badge Sash. If worn, merit badges are attached to front (and back, if needed) of sash. Venture/Varsity letter is attached at bottom front corner. Temporary insignia may be worn on back.


Shoulder Epaulets. Red shoulder loops identify Boy Scouting (all members of a troop). Blaze (orange) loops indentify Varsity Scouting.

Left Sleeve. Council patches, unit numeral, and badge of office are worn as shown snug up, and touching each other. Badge of office is centered below and touches unit numeral. The veteran unit bar (25, 50, 55, 60, 65, 70, 75, or 80 years) is positioned above and touching troop numeral and in turn touching council patch. Den chief cord is worn over the left shoulder and under epaulet.

Left Pocket. Service stars above the pocket. If a medal or embroidered knot for youth members is worn, service stars are raised. Embroidered square knots are worn centered above the pocket in rows of three. Not more than five medals may be worn, pinned centered immediately above the pocket (extending over knots if both are worn). The wearing sequence for knots or medals is at the wearer's discretion and lead color is to the wearer's right. Badges of rank are worn centered on the pocket above the Arrow of Light Award. Flap buttoned. The World Crest is worn centered horizontally over the left pocket and vertically between the left shoulder seam and the top of the pocket.

Right Sleeve. U.S. flag. Only the most recently earned Quality Unit Award may be worn below patrol emblem or below National Honor Patrol star. Musician badge, if in band or drum corps, is worn ½ inch below patrol emblem. Up to six merit badges may be worn on the long-sleeve shirt in two columns of three starting 3 inches above the bottom edge of the cuff.

Right Pocket. Jamboree insignia (only one) worn above BSA or interpreter strip. Order of the Arrow lodge insignia worn on pocket flap. Temporary insignia worn centered on the pocket. Flap buttoned. The Varsity or Venture strip is worn above the BSA strip or above the interpreter strip. Nameplate, if worn, is centered above the BSA strip, interpreter strip, and Venture or Varsity strip.

ADVANCEMENT

The Boy Scout Advancement Program is described in your Official Boy Scout Handbook.

When you first join Scouting, you will earn the rank of SCOUT. You will then advance through the ranks of Scouting from TENDERFOOT to SECOND CLASS, FIRST CLASS, STAR, LIFE and finally EAGLE SCOUT. Advancement is achieved through a combination of earning Merit Badges, participation in Troop activities, demonstrating leadership in the Troop, showing Scout Spirit, and time in the Scouting Program.

It is important that the Scouts work towards advancement as it keeps them interested in the program and gives them a sense of accomplishment.

MERIT BADGES

There are over a hundred different Merit Badges you can choose from. Merit Badges are required for advancement to the higher Scouting ranks. Some of these Merit Badges are specifically required for each rank (such as the First Aid Merit Badge), while others are optional (such as Sailing and Electronics Merit Badges). A Merit Badge must be earned with the permission of the Scoutmaster, or while participating in a B.S.A. authorized and supervised activity. Examples of such activities are B.S.A. summer camps, Eagles Flight or by selecting a Merit Badge Counselor and working on your own.

Earning merit badges requires a great deal of individual effort and close work with a B.S.A.. or Troop approved merit badge counselor, who will test you in your chosen subject. The general procedure for earning a Merit Badge is as follows:

- 1. You decide to work on a specific badge
- 2. You contact your Scoutmaster or Advancement Advisor and obtain a Merit Badge "Blue Card" and the name of the Merit Badge Counselor, if you do not know whom to contact.
- 3. Get permission from your Scoutmaster to work on your chosen Merit Badge. The Scoutmaster will sign your Blue Card at that time.
- 4. Contact the Merit Badge Counselor and work out a schedule for the completion of the requirements.
- 5. You work on the Merit Badge requirements. There are booklets available from the Troop Librarian for each Merit Badge subject which will provide you with helpful information. Your Merit Badge Counselor will help you in areas of difficulty, and in many cases, will provide additional training opportunities for you.



- 6. When you are ready, contact your Merit Badge Counselor for the examination. Upon successful completion, the Merit Badge Counselor will sign your Blue Card.
- 7. Give the signed Blue Card to your Scoutmaster who will pass it to the Advancement Chair. You will then receive your Merit Badge at the next Court of Honor.
- 8. Blue Cards MUST be turned in no later than one week prior to the Court of Honor. There will be no exceptions unless prior arrangements have been made with the Advancement Chair.
- 9. Scoutmaster conferences will be held two (2) weeks prior to a Court of Honor by the Scoutmaster at Troop meetings. Boards of Review will be held one (1) week prior to a Court of Honor and are BY APPOINTMENT ONLY by the Advancement Chair. The Scout must be in a "Class A" uniform for a Scoutmaster Conference and the Board of Review.

CAMPING EQUIPMENT LIST

To ensure the Scouts get the most out of their camping experience, a list of the equipment and clothing, they will need on a campout can be found on the next page. It is better to bring too much (within reason) on a campout then not enough. As the Scouts get more experienced with camping they will find what they need and don't need. But until then they should use the list provided. The Boy Scout Handbook also give the details on the items listed.

In addition to the equipment each Scout needs to bring he will be required to have an Authorization for Consent to Treatment of Minor form on record with Troop 90 and a Parent's Permission for Special Activities to go on a camp-out or special event. An annual medical examination is also required.

If a Scout has his Tot'n Chip he may bring a pocketknife. Any other type of knife will be taken from the Scout and given back to the parents after the camp-out. There is no need for a Scout to bring a hatchet or ax.

If you have any questions on equipment or clothing needs, please contact your Patrol Leader, Senior Patrol Leader, the Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster before the camp-out.
